## Sorting Sentences 1

### Complete Sentences

**Complete sentences** express a complete thought. They can be long or short. They have a **subject** that tells “who or what” and a **predicate** that tells the action the subject is doing or gives information about the subject.

#### Examples:

Caribou run fast across the frozen land.

Geese fly.

My mom Daisy went shopping at Northern, and then she visited her friend Doris.

At the end of the hockey game, I took off my skates and put away my hockey stick.

### Sentence Fragments

**Sentence fragments** may look like sentences, but they are not complete. They might not tell who or what and so do not have a **subject**. They might not have a **predicate** and so are missing the action or information about the **subject**.

#### Examples:

The red pickup truck along the highway.

Ran across the finish-line to win the game.

While the waves on James Bay splashed into white foam on the beach.

Because dogs need to be fed every day.

### Run-On Sentences

Run on sentences happen when two sentences are joined improperly. They may be joined with ‘and’, a comma (,), or no punctuation at all. This makes them confusing.

#### Examples:

I love our gym class my favourite game is dodgeball.

On our field trip we went to the high ground and listened to the Elders and we ate bannock and we went outside to walk in the forest.

My friends enjoy playing video games Monday we played Fortnite together.

Next weekend is my birthday party and I want all my friends to come because we will go to the swimming pool to have lots of fun.
